# ANEW GRANT NEWSLETTER Spring 2025

#### **Spring Workshop**

With an objective to increase confidence within the clinical setting the ANEW team developed and hosted a Spring workshop focused on women and men's health. Workshops are built every semester to coincide with the clinical FNP course that students are taking, and include topics suggested by preceptors, practice partners, faculty, and students. We were thrilled to have several healthcare professionals from our communities attend and share their expertise. Topics included: peri-menopause and menopause, presented by Lisa Harmon, WHNP from Community Clinic of NWA, Contraception by Hope Ballentine, CNM from Eleanor Mann School of Nursing, Urology by Daniel Pevril, FNP from Vitality Plus Urology in Mountain Home, Ar., Pelvic Floor by Ashley Striegler Morris, DPT, Pelvic Therapist from Washington Regional Medical System in Fayetteville, AR, and IUD insertion by Lindsey Hill, CNM from Bayer US Medical Affairs.

Participants included our FNP students, as well as providers from academic practice partners, building upon previous success of collaborative learning. Evaluations of the workshop indicate effectiveness in increasing student confidence: 94% said the workshop increased their confidence as they continue in their clinical experience, and 100% stated their satisfaction with the workshop. The ANEW team continues to create workshops that provide students with current knowledge and skills relevant to the clinical courses they take. We are grateful to our guest presenters, and to our preceptors who share their expertise and provide timely content suggestions. Our workshops expose students to a much richer experience because of them! We also appreciate the opportunity to connect with members of the healthcare community, who have also shared positive comments about their involvement in our workshops:

Thank you, Ginger, for being a positive role model and for volunteering your time to give back to our FNP students!




To disseminate the findings from their final DNP projects, students presented at the 2025 Eleanor Mann School of Nursing Nurse Science Day.



#### **Dissemination of Grant Work**

The ANEW grant team has disseminated some of their work at two professional nursing conferences this year. A poster based upon their publication, "Changes in Precepting Since COVID-19: A Mixed Methods Study," was

presented at the Eleanor Mann School of Nursing's Nursing Science Day. Additionally, they presented a poster on the ANEW grant course offered to DNP-FNP students, "Understanding Poverty in Healthcare Through Experiential Learning", at the American Association of Colleges of Nursing's Access, Connection, and Engagement (ACE) Symposium in Indianapolis. In addition to the positive

feedback from other conference attendees, and the opportunity to engage with schools of nursing from around the country, the grant team was able to hear about and network with other ANEW grant programs.
